ABOUT HOMEBOY

Over the past 28 years, Homeboy Industries has become the preeminent gang rehab and re-entry organization in the world, transforming lives locally in Los Angeles and leading a global movement for compassionate community.

Homeboy Industries breaks barriers to employment and integration into society for former gang members and felons. Homeboy helps men and women break a cycle of violence and despair and replace it with hope and healing. This year, Homeboy will impact the lives of more than 9,000 people with life-changing programs, and job training and placement.

With Homeboy's help these individuals will develop the strength and skills to change their lives and contribute to our community. Homeboy takes a holistic approach with therapeutic and educational offerings (case management, counseling, and classes); practical services (tattoo removal, work readiness, and legal assistance); and social enterprises (Homeboy Bakery, Homegirl Café & Catering, and Homeboy Silkscreen & Embroidery).

Two years ago the Global Homeboy Network was created to nourish like-minded organizations that are creating healthier communities by standing with those on the margins of society. Now, more than 70 organizations across the US and around the globe model and apply Homeboy's principles to help men and women of all kinds to come integrate into society.

In 2015, social enterprise accounted for 40% of Homeboy Industries' revenue while providing compensation and benefits for hundreds of men and women. The paycheck helps legitimize a population that has never had access to a traditional ladder of success.. It offers dignity and spending power, and a reason to get up in the morning.

"My story is familiar," says Homeboy graduate Dominique Frazier. She was raised by a single mother and bullied at school. She acted out and landed in foster care, juvenile hall, and eventually prison. She became involved in an abusive relationship.

Her inspiration to change this pattern would also be familiar to others who seek Homeboy's help: "With the arrival of my beautiful son Demarion, I began to imagine a better life for the two of us."


That's when her script began to change. She began working on Homeboy's maintenance crew, and then as an assistant in the Advancement department. Eventually she took charge of all tours coming through Homeboy Industries. She taught a public speaking class and shared her story at public events. She earned her GED.

After graduating, she began working as an

administrative assistant at Viamericas/Fortress Guard Services. After six months on the job, she became Acting Human Resources Manager.

"I am very grateful that my mother sent me to Homeboy Industries," she emailed us recently. "I wouldn't be sitting here typing from my own desk otherwise."

"I am not a victim, I am a survivor," became her mantra.

Anyone who's watched reality TV knows that commercial kitchens and bakeries are notoriously high-stakes environments. But Javier Medina, a former trainee who now works at Thomas Keller's Beverly Hills restaurant Bouchon, has faced far more frightening things in his time.

With the help of his mother, Javier started recovery with Alcoholics Anonymous. Soon after, he came to Homeboy Industries for tattoo removal. "I was curious about this place. I started asking around. They gave me an interview."

The Homeboy community was instrumental in helping Javier transform his circumstances. Nearing the end of his time here, he recalled: "I've never seen any gang [rehabilitation] program like this. They helped me out with my anger issues. I see a therapist. I'm always happy now. I'm calm. I was known for my violence. When I run into people I knew back in the day, they say, 'I'm not used to you being so nice.' I say, 'I'm in recovery.

I don't do drugs, I've been clean.' And they say, 'You look happy, man. I want what you have.' I tell them, 'You want this? I can take you to a place when you're ready to stop messing around."

Javier found it hard to leave Homeboy Bakery. Like many trainees, he got comfortable there. When he was offered an internship at Bouchon, he initially turned it down. Beverly Hills was a world away from everything he knew. "I turned it down, like, 20 times; I was afraid of change," Medina recently told the Los Angeles Times. "I told them, 'I'm not going over there with all those snobby people!"

But Javier had faced his fear of change before, so he decided to face it again in order to begin the next phase of his life. "When I got [to Bouchon], I started getting to know people, and I noticed that everybody was cool. Nobody was dissing me, and it felt good."

In the recovery community, people often say that "the program works if you work it."
Javier knows that the same is true at Homeboy Industries.

"In 2013, at Lo Maximo, it was the first time I was able to express myself It was a message to let people know the struggle we have to go through. I realized that I need to tell the story and people need to know and Father G was the first that believed in that. Homebov is my family, where I feel like home. "
