

Support

2024 marked a powerful year of transformation at Homeboy Industries. More than 10,000 people walked through our doors seeking a better life and we welcomed a record number of trainees into our nationally recognized 18-month reentry program. We added our 14th social enterprise, a dog grooming salon called Puppy Fades, to our portfolio of businesses creating more quality jobs. And we relocated the Homeboy Art Academy to a modern space in the Capitol Milling building in Chinatown, cross-corner from our main campus at 130 Bruno. Each of these milestones represented new investments in hope for those for whom hope has been foreign, all made possible by a community of donors and volunteers who believe in the idea of Homeboy – that we belong to each other.

With the conclusion of Tom Vozzo's twelve years of indelible leadership, we step forward as Co-CEOs with deep gratitude and an unwavering commitment to build on the foundation he helped strengthen— and to chart a vision to change the way the world views, treats and judges the most marginalized amongst us.

At Homeboy, we meet people at the margins with radical kinship and practical hope. As Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy named loneliness and isolation among the greatest public health crises of our time, we see how these forces deepen the trauma experienced by those who have long been pushed aside. But we don't just help people survive—we're committed to helping people thrive. Too often, society settles for making people less miserable. We aim higher: to ensure people are well.

To that end, in 2024 we expanded our Wellness Department to meet trauma from every angle—through therapy, on-site psychiatry, sidewalk sessions, and healthcare partnerships that meet people where they are. We know healing begins with connection—and at Homeboy, it often begins with a job.

We are a national model for alternatives to incarceration—offering an exit ramp from cycles of violence, trauma, and imprisonment. Our first job is to help people transform their pain, so they don't transmit it. That transformation ripples out—into families, neighborhoods, and the broader community. It's how we build public safety, and more importantly, how we build healthy communities.

With Puppy Fades and expanding employer partnerships, we invested further in creating quality jobs through our social enterprises and new career pathways. More of our participants than ever before enrolled in higher education—earning degrees at every level. These are not just milestones—they are proof that with the right support, people can and do flourish.

All of this is possible because our community of supporters that has continued to invest in the transformational movement of Homeboy Industries. More than 9,000 thousand donors invested over \$28 million dollars of support in 2024, supporting every area of the organization. And impactful government partnerships generated critical funding to build a new future for our community.

Our hearts remain filled with gratitude to our Homeboy family of supporters and partners who power a movement that began nearly four decades ago with a prayer: that the day will come when we stop throwing people away. With your support, we bring that future closer—every single day.

Homeboy Industries provides hope, training, and support to formerly gang-involved and previously incarcerated people allowing them to redirect their lives and become contributing members of our community.



Each year over 10,000 former gang members from across Los Angeles come through Homeboy Industries' doors in an effort to make a positive change. They are welcomed into a community of mutual kinship, love, and a wide variety of services ranging from tattoo removal to anger management and parenting classes.

Currently, employment is offered for more than 180 men and women through a thoughtful, strategic 18-month program that focuses on healing just as much as it focuses on developing work readiness skills. Our overarching goal is to see individuals heal from trauma, allowing them to contribute fully to their family and community. The five key outcomes we strive for as an organization are: 1) Reduce recidivism, 2) Reduce substance abuse, 3) Improve social connectedness, 4) Improve housing safety and stability, and 5) Reunify families.





In 2024, Homeboy Industries' overall revenue was \$51.4 million, with an event revenues increase of 2% and social enterprise revenues increase of 13%. Program expenses represent an investment in trainee workforce development, wrap-around services for trainee and community clients, and social enterprise, and these costs comprise 83% of our total expenses.

Homeboy Media

In 2024, we established the Homeboy Media arm of Homeboy Industries. The mission is to create new revenue channels for Homeboy Industries as well as economic mobility pathways for our population within the media and content creation sectors. By leveraging Homeboy's innate storytelling gifts and the proximity to the entertainment industry in Hollywood, Homeboy Media will create three verticals or foundational channels: multiplatform content creation, workforce development in media, and the promotion of Homeboy Industries' own social enterprises within the entertainment industry of Los Angeles.

Homeboy Harvest

Homeboy Harvest (previously Homeboy Agriculture) has a mission to cultivate our food economy by providing local produce to marginalized communities who lack access to healthy foods and education surrounding nutrition. Homeboy Harvest provides hands-on job training to trainees in the 18-month program. In July 2024, Homeboy Harvest received a CFCI grant from the JCOD County of Los Angeles. This grant helped launch construction on a 5,000 sq ft warehouse in Lincoln Heights, adjacent to the Commissary Kitchen and Job Training Center under construction.
